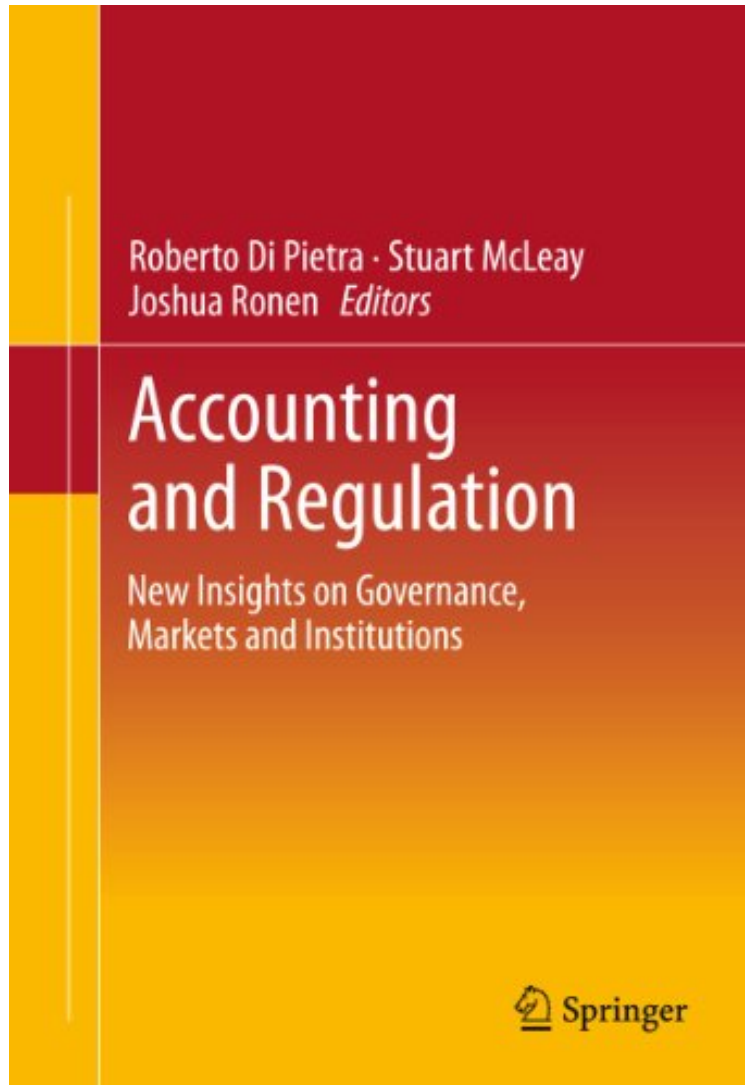


Accounting and Regulation: New Insights on Governance, Markets and Institutions
