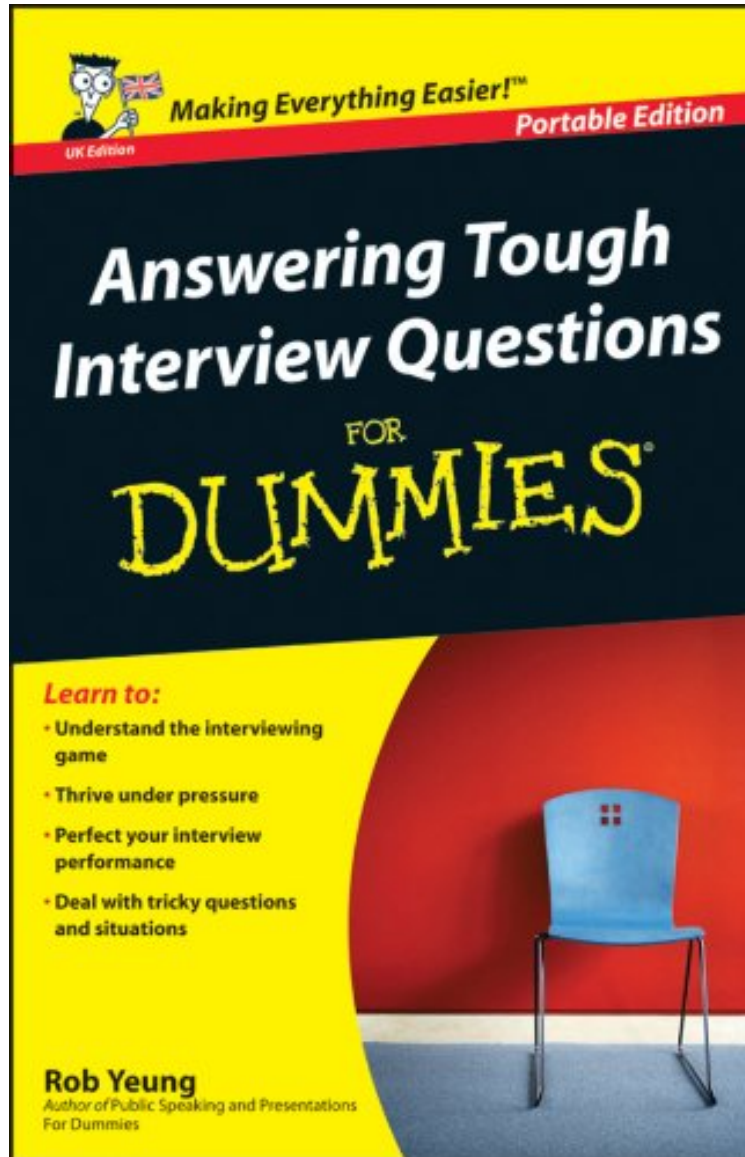

ask questions at the end of your interview. A few years ago, as an experienced ICU nurse, I wasn't sure how I wasn't getting jobs after interviews that seemed to go really well. I have recently begun asking "what's the best thing about working here?" and "what's the worst?" and it's been eye-opening. Also, I started getting more consistent job offers. However, most of the stuff in this book is fairly common sense--how to pick professional attire, to not arrive late, and to smile when walking in, to shake hands, firmly, but not like a vise...really? What am I...15? (I think I pretty much knew at 15, too, but you get my drift.) Much of the content was geared towards working in the UK, and working for a "for profit" type of agency, so very little could be turned to health care (but, to be fair, I think most people in the world work at for-profit agencies or businesses, so I don't fault them for covering their bell-curve majority.) However, there were terms and conditions specific to being a British Citizen that don't apply here in the US (certain types of work contracts or hiring conditions...don't remember now and don't want to scroll thru the kindle.) In all, I think there was a nugget or two of info that was good, but the rest was geared to a very specific geography and among them, those whom had never been on an interview before. I thought the material was well-written, and a fair overall product. If you are reading this and you're in the UK, and have a teen-ager about to go from school to their first job interview, I would venture this book would be a 4 or 5 star venture for you.
