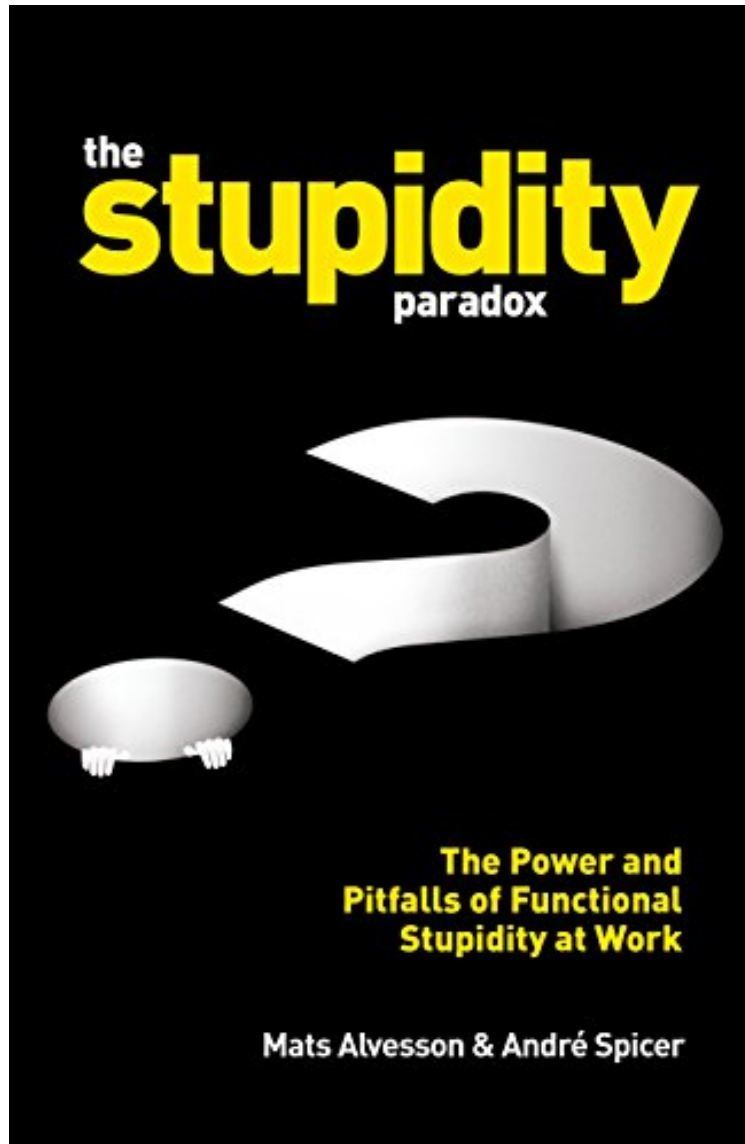

Interesting theory the authors pose: if such people didn't have jobs, society would have to feed them through dole, and this way they are kept docile. The authors also call for managers and CEO to look at the long term cost of stupidity they allow in their corporations - the short term benefits are just that, short term.
