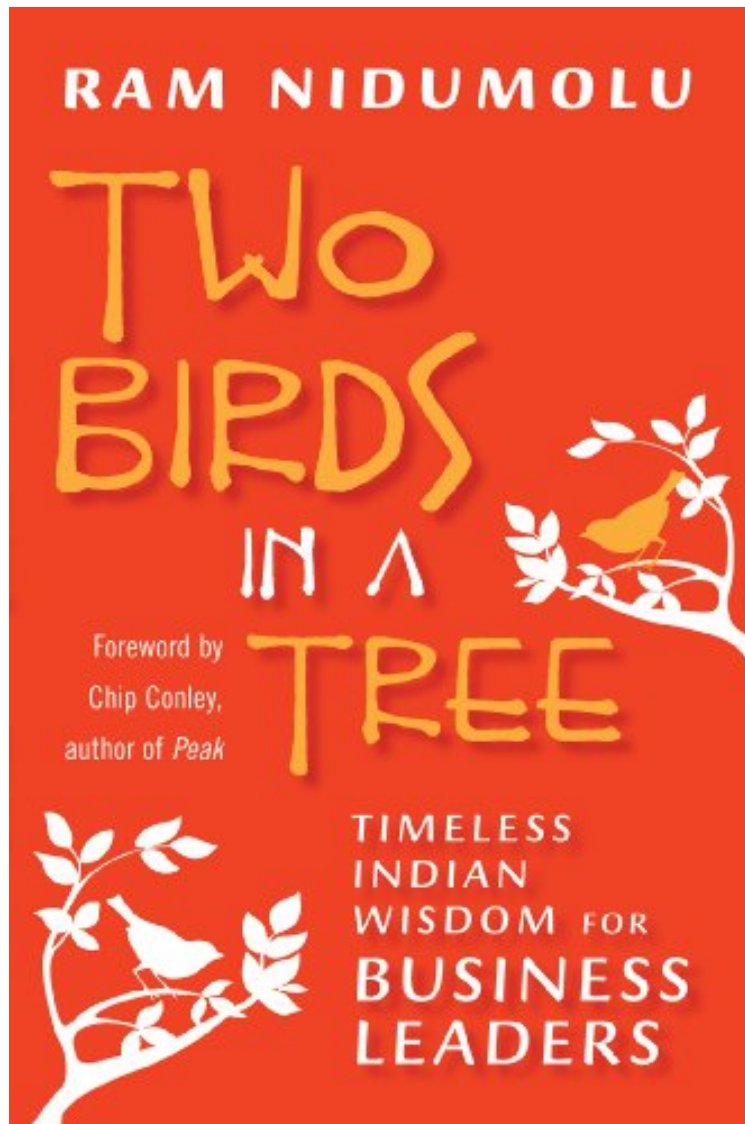

SavagePerhaps more timely than ever, Ram Nidumolu's *Two Birds in a Tree*, seems to have awoken in 2013 a momentary sense of excitement for a totally different approach to business leadership. Recent discussions of the choice to call our current era the Anthropocene touch on Nidumolu's themes. In arrogance, can we humans use our "technology" to "fix" our environmental shortsightedness? Or in humility, need we reconnect with NATURE, including our own HUMAN NATURE (the point of Nidumolu's book)?For a Western Mind, schooled in "objective reality," it is next to impossible to grasp the wisdom of which he is talking. For over a year, I struggled to not only understand the insights of the Upanishads, but to begin to grok them. So much of what we know gets in the way of exploring the unknown and the unknowable. Our schooling gives us the false sense of confidence that we know, yet leaving us ignorant of our own ignorance.Our five senses are so very noisy, overwhelming us with fragmentary data. Caught in the prison of the present, we often fail to see life's unfolding over time, enriched by the insights of the past and the challenges of the future. The noise of the present drowns out the deeper rhythm and texture of life itself, where all humans share life's vital energy (what he calls Being). The light of this energy in our hearts allows each of us to bring a unique contribution to the larger whole.In our Industrial Era we envisioned our minds like machines, and we've seen one another as cogs messing together. In moving to the Digital Era, confronted by VUCA, volatility, uncertainty, complexity and ambiguity, as it manifest itself in AI, the Internet of Things and Big Data Analytics, we need to connect with one another in deeper ways if we are to co-create a wiser future. For this to happen, we may need to leave our arrogance of SMART and learn the humility of the WISE?As we remember, Gandhi mobilized an entire nation around the notion of non-violence (ahimsa). What if we were to realize that our own violence to one another and nature were to make it impossible for us to live on our dear planet for the next 500 to 800 million years (before water leaves us)? Reconnecting with our Two Birds can energize us with the insights and drive to bring out so much more of life. The wisdom of the Rishis was not just for India, but a gift for us all, bringing hope in a time of profound confusion. It seems the wonderful spirit of the teenager, Nachiketa, is inspiring Ram in his Me-We Project at the Kozmetshy Global Collaboratory at Stanford. Might we all benefit from this!
